

THE EUROPE WE WANT

The **European Constitution** that Heads of State and Government are preparing to adopt is not based on fundamental human and civil rights. The Constitution is of the utmost importance for residents in the European Union because decisive issues **are at stake**.

RESPECT FOR ALL HUMAN AND CIVIL RIGHTS

The European Union should be built upon the principles of real **human rights which are universal** and indivisible rather than upon commercial strategies and social regression.

SPREADING RIGHTS AT THEIR HIGHEST LEVELS

European integration should not reduce the rights its residents already enjoy in each Member State. On the contrary, we want to see these rights developed at the highest levels pertaining in Member States so that residents of the European Union enjoy equal, maximum rights.

FUNDAMENTAL RIGHTS IN THE SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC FIELDS AS WELL

The European Constitution should affirm: **the right to a job and the rights of employees, the right to health care, the rights of families and children, the rights of the aged, the rights of the disabled, the right to education and training, the right to housing, the right to culture, the right to free speech, to assembly and freedom of movement.**

IDENTICAL RIGHTS FOR ALL RESIDENTS

The European Constitution should guarantee equal citizenship to all its residents whatever their nationality or origin.

FULL RECOGNITION OF **NGOs** AND TRADE UNIONS

There can be no democracy without the active participation of all citizens. European institutions must fully recognise NGOs and trade unions.

PUBLIC SERVICES **SERVING THE COMMON INTEREST**

Based on equality and social cohesion, the Europe we want maintains and develops public services for **the common good**.
